| <u>Word</u> | <u>Part of Speech</u> | <u>Definition</u>  |
|-------------|-----------------------|--|
| Candidacy   | Noun                  | the state of being a candidate   |
| Nomination  | Noun                  | the appointment of somebody to a position, or assignment of somebody to a duty   |
| Barred      | Verb                  | Cut off, not allowed   |
| Principles  | Noun                  | a standard of moral or ethical decision-making   |
| Reform      | Noun                  | a change and improvement, especially in the social or political sphere   |
| Agenda      | Noun                  | The list of goals and desires a politician wants to meet is elected  |
| Scandal     | Noun                  | a situation or event that causes public outrage  |
| Watergate   | Noun                  | a political scandal stemming from a break-in by Republican operatives at the 1972 U.S. Democratic National Committee headquarters, which were in the Watergate complex in Washington, D.C. The scandal led to the resignation of President Nixon and the conviction and imprisonment of a number of his closest aides. |
| Mainstream  | Noun                  | the ideas, actions, and values that are most widely accepted by a group or society, e.g. in politics, fashion, or music  |
| Caucuses    | Noun                  | a closed meeting of people from one political party, especially a local meeting to select delegates or candidates  |
| Primary     | Noun                  | an election in which members of a party choose candidates for a governmental positio   |
